From the Rector: Homecoming Sunday

Every September, typically the first Sunday after Labor Day, we begin a new church program year. We welcome the choir back in our Sunday morning worship, we re-engage ministries that have been put on hold during the summer, we welcome home members of our parish family who have used the summer months for travel and leisure.

Over the years, we've struggled with what to call this Sunday. We've called it Ministry or Mission Sunday and used it as an opportunity to celebrate the church's ministry and identify the many ways our parishioners can be involved in the life of the church. We've called it Start-Up or Kick-Off Sunday to promote the notion that ministries are re-engaging but that always made it sound like ministry had stopped. (Ministry in the church



never stops.) More recently, we've come to refer to our first Sunday of the program year as Homecoming Sunday.

Homecoming Sunday is a name that works well as we recognize our return from time away and the stability of home to which to return. And, this year, more than ever, Homecoming Sunday has some very deep emotional and spiritual meaning.

Over the past 18 months we have been adrift in the seas of the coronavirus pandemic. We have worked together as a parish family to keep our parish connected. We have worshiped in new and unique ways, we have gathered online and visited with each other remotely. We have loved and learned together from a distance. By the grace of God, we have maintained a healthy parish family.

And yet, we all know there are some who are missing. Some who were not willing or able to participate through virtual means. Some who have been disconnected from the church and our parish life. Some for whom this pandemic and the social distancing it required drove a wedge between them, their faith, and their church family.

Homecoming Sunday is an opportunity to reach out to all our parishioners and welcome them home. It is a chance for us to remind one another that we are church family, we are brothers and sisters in Christ, that our

The Future of LiveStreaming

Since the beginning of our pandemic quarantine in March 2020, we have been producing prerecorded Sunday morning liturgies through which we could worship, as community, while we stayed safe in our homes and reduced the spread of the coronavirus. These liturgies were made possible by dedicated parishioners, staff, choir, and clergy who came together at various

times (remotely and in-person) to record various parts of the liturgy.

We are dedicated to maintaining our online presence, even as we return to in-person worship. The online offerings allow us to reach people far from San Diego and also allow parishioners who may not be able to be with us on Sunday morning to worship along with our community.



We are in the process of procuring and installing a livestream video and audio system in the church which will allow us to stream, in real time, the services as they happen. As such, we will no longer need to pre-record liturgies or produce worship videos. Rather, what we post online will be exactly what's happening in the church!

We will need folks who are interested in being trained on the livestream system to help us produce our Sunday morning offerings. If this is something that interests you, please let Fr. Joe know. And help us to bring our beautiful worship and joyful praise to the far reaches of the world!

What's up with the cushions?

In April 2020, as we were prepping the church in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, we removed the pew cushions as a safety measure. As we began to gather again in-person inside the church, we discovered that there were some issues with returning the cushions as is. Namely, the cushions are dirty and dusty (they are showing their age). In addition, the acoustics of the church are significantly better without the cushions. (In fact, in 1986 when Paul Fritts installed our beautiful organ, he recommended that the cushions be removed to enhance the musical quality of the room).

As we get estimates for cleaning, repair, and perhaps replacement, we are encouraging the use of individual cushions. All those who need cushions are invited to use the individual seat cushions available in the church. And, of course, all those who don't need a cushion can just sit on the pew.


The All Souls' Book Club






Fall Worship at All Souls'

This Month's Gracious Rohr By Lorraine Padden

We sometimes credit "divine inspiration" for bringing about positive outcomes that seemingly arise not from our own efforts alone but with help from some other source. As if by momentarily loosening our grip on our capacity or know-how, a new option or direction emerges that results in a blessing of success. As if relinquishing force and accepting guidance made all the difference.

Father Rohr offers a view into this phenomenon through the lens of photography by offering the following comments by artist Christine Valters Paintner. In reading her words I wonder if the description of "receiving" rather than "taking" images isn't also somehow related to an interpretation of Philippians 2:7 that describes kenosis, the process through which Jesus "emptied" his human self in order to embody divine grace and a union with God. By shifting from human certainty and drive to vulnerable release and unknowing, through no force of his own, Jesus created space for (and became one with) the most sacred of gifts.

Seen in this light, perhaps art-making is really room-making—a process that creates the space where moments of human intention **and** divine inspiration may intersect in their fullness and be received as Paintner suggests, "with our whole hearts." ~LP

Receiving Images

Artist and author Christine Valters Paintner explores how we might reconsider traditional approaches to photography. Instead of "taking" pictures, she asks us to "receive" images similar to how we might welcome the presence of God in contemplation.

Contemplative practice is a receptive practice. We make ourselves available for grace to break in; we open ourselves to listen and ponder...

We often use the word "take" to describe our relationship with photography. Our culture emphasizes taking time, taking what's mine, and taking a break. What we are endeavoring to do in this process, however, is to *receive* (rather than *take*) the gifts around us, to be present enough so that, when the photographic moment arrives, we are able to receive it fully, with our whole hearts.

"Taking photos" is a common phrase, and changing

that perception and process (especially if you use a smartphone, Lomo, or other disposable camera) may be hard to break, but I gently invite you to consider what reframing this process might be like for you and what it evokes in you. I invite you to bring a new awareness to how words and phrases can shape our experience and practices.

Rather than "taking" photos or "shooting" them or even "making" photos, we will practice "receiving" images as gift. The traditional words for photography are possessive and aggressive. Yet the actual mechanism of photography is that light is reflected off of a subject and *received* by the camera through the lens opening. We can create conditions for a "good" photo, but ultimately we must stand in a posture of receiving and see what actually shows up in the image.

The poet Rainer Maria Rilke [1875–1926] writes in one of his poems of "no forcing [and no] holding back." [1] When we are receptive we let go of our agendas and expectations. We allow ourselves to see beneath preconceived ideas. Rather than going after what we want in life, or "forcing," we cultivate a contentment with what actually is. Similarly, instead of "holding back" and merely observing life or falling asleep to it, we stay awake and alert, participating fully in its messiness and we keep our eyes open for the holy presence in its midst. Photographing in this way can become an act of revelation. One of the gifts of art in general, and photography in particular, is that the artist can offer others this vision of the graced ordinary moment.

Outreach News and Updates by Carol Sands

The ART of Inclusive Communication

The National Conflict Resolution Center offered an in-person training class at All Souls' on "The Art of Inclusive Communication" on Saturday, August 21, from 9 to noon.

At a time when we are surrounded by animosity, hate speech, and hardened viewpoints, it seems that this training is something we could all put to good use.



The training was an interactive workshop dealing with responding respectfully in conflict situations, and managing emotions in tough conversations with those who have different values, beliefs and perspectives.

NCRC is all about teaching people to communicate more effectively to reduce conflict and see that everyone feels valued, respected and understood.

The larger picture is that All Souls' and the diocese are working with Steve Slocum of the non-profit Salaam, on a new program called "Real Friends, Real Community". We are working to put together intentionally diverse groups of 10 to 16 people to meet every two weeks for six months to find meaningful connection through telling our stories, and to work toward building a culture of inclusion, equity and diversity. Steve has been speaking at several churches in the diocese, and has been seeking to pull together San Diegans of color who come from various religions, ethnic backgrounds, gender and sexual identities, as well as immigrants to share their perspectives. It is hoped that these groups will start meeting in September.

The NCRC communication workshop serves as a kind of preamble - a chance to think what it might be like to have meaningful conversation with a truly diverse group of people. You can learn more about Salaam at <u>SalaamUSA.org</u>.



Mission to Seafarers

Mission to Seafarers seeks "deconstruction" workers

The Episcopal Church, Diocese of San Diego, is part of the mission to the commercial vessels that dock in San Diego, and we have a center in the Barrio Logan region just inside the gate to the Port. For several dec-



ades this center has greeted ships' company at pier 10 and 24. Dole is the primary source of the ships at Pier 10 and automobiles arrive at pier 24. We have sent chaplains aboard the ships to greet them and the Seafarer Center hosted the ship's crews with games, a lounge, telephone service, and a chapel. We partner with the Roman Catholic church who named it the Stella Maris center.

Due to various security requirements and the restrictions for getting off the ships, the mission has decreased from its former

glory. Just before the pandemic, we had volunteers who dropped off magazines coordinated by Neil Malmquist of All Souls parish. With two vans we could transport the crew members to shore for a few hours. Now this mission has stopped except for the magazines.

The center consists of two mobile-home trailers connected in an L-shape with offices, lounge and chapel surrounding a large deck with pool table, ping pong, and board games. We had concessions they could purchase. Due to the deteriorating condition of the materials that cover and connect these facilities, one of the trailers needs to be removed, along with the connecting structures, deck, ramp, etc.

Therefore we need workers to help with the De-Construction of the supporting structure around one of the trailers that will be re-purposed. The remaining trailer that was the chapel will become an office and greeting area. Some of the deck will be preserved and rebuilt.

One or two Fridays in October, the 15th and/or the 29th are the dates proposed for the repurposing, The port and the RC church will provide most of the labor but we hope to bring several Episcopalians along to assist. Please consider giving us your time and talents if you have them to offer. It should be a lively opportunity to meet some interesting people in a fascinating location and accomplish a deeply needed task. We may need volunteers to put together a lunch and coffee as well.

Let me know if you are interested. We must submit all possible names to the port authority in time to get the proper clearances. Bring tools, hard-toe shoes or boots, and a good attitude for changing the course of our mission at the Port of San Diego. In addition to the construction, we will be re-evaluating our mission, and pray that we may again have meaningful interaction with the crews and leaders.

God's blessing to those who provide us with all that arrives on ships from all over the world, and we welcome the opportunity to serve them for years to come.
